PS 133 WILLIAM A. BUTLER SCHOOL IN BROOKLYN MEETS THE SWISS CONSULATE

In the context of the French language initiative <u>«Adopt a School»</u>, the Consulate General of Switzerland launched its partnership with <u>PS 133 William A. Butler School in Brooklyn</u> last Friday with a modern dance performance by <u>Marie-Christine Giordano Dance</u>.

Originally developed by the *The International Organisation of La Francophonie* (OIF) and *French Education in New York* (EFNY) in 2015, the initiative «Adopt a School» invites representations of French-speaking countries to « adopt» a New York City public school that has a French-English dual language program or another strong French language component. The idea to introduce this program at PS 133 came from parents of Swiss pupils. This eventually led to the Swiss Consulate General's engagement within the context of «Adopt a School» as a sponsor of PS 133.

Friday's dance performance marked the launch of the partnership between the Swiss Consulate and the school. The performance was attended by all children that are part of the bilingual program, their teachers as well as representatives of the OIF and the Cultural Services of the French Embassy. Just prior to the performance, Matthias Dettling, Head of Culture & Education at the Swiss Consulate, welcomed the audience with a few remarks about Switzerland and its connection to the French language. Swiss dancer and choreographer Marie-Christine Giordano continued with an interesting explanation about the medium of dance as an expressive, healing, and unifying art form which was

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followed by byher ensemble's smooth performance, both with and without musical accompaniment. The children were thus offered an unusual modern dance experience. After the performance, the children had the opportunity to practice their French and ask Ms. Giordano questions about her dance performance and her life as a Swiss living in New York.
